
A global survey based on 3345 responses

- The FUNDS 2012 survey was conducted in February and March 2012 and provides a detailed account of the
 relevance and effectiveness of the organizations within the UN Development System as well as an account of
 the key challenges and priorities moving forward.
- The survey contains information from 3345 respondents covering 153 countries around the world


UN optimist

UN skeptics


- The most skeptical respondents are found among more experienced from developed countries working in non-UN international public organizations

Knowledge and perception of areas within the UN Development System





Familiarity with and perception of UN Development System organizations






Key challenges to the UN Development System





Note: "UN optimists" are defined as respondents who believe that the UN system is capable of handling own organizational challenges as well as new development challenges, while "UN skeptics" are defined as respondents who do not believe that the UN system is capable of handling these challenges. The group of "UN neutrals" entails respondents who have an opinion, but are neither "UN optimists" nor "UN skeptics".

Relevance and effectiveness of UN Development System Organizations




Share of respondents who believe that the organization is highly relevant in terms of supporting the UN mission of promoting social progress and better standards of life in larger freedom (per cent)

The importance of key factors within the UN Development System




Share of respondents who believe the factor makes an important contribution (per cent)


Initiatives to be considered over the next five years

Inspiration for change

In the survey the respondents were asked to state one or two important changes that could be made to the UN Development System to improve its effectiveness today. More than 1,500 respondents choose to answer the question, providing in-depth insight on challenges and recommendations going forward.

Create a unified UN Development System structure (allowing agencies to continue based on thematic area), with a single set of administrative and financial norms, a single information system, a single program at the country level and an internationally respected development figure as its president." (NGO, Spain)

Streamline organization structure and cut out the waste, utilize NGO capacity more." (Private sector, Zambia)

More clearly defined career paths" (NGO, United Kingdom)

Provide more funds for UN WOMEN and ensure UN WOMEN drives all gender related activities within UN. UN WOMEN should have more staff and multi-annual programs." (Private sector, Serbia)

The UN should make itself more well-known and loved, a better website for public support and the ability to understand what is accomplished."
(Academia, United States)

Harmonize business practices among agencies and simplify bureaucratic procedures that slow the UN down." (UN Organization, United States)
